
COUNT DAT DATA HIGHLIGHT: MARDI GRAS 2023

Carnival Season is among the busiest times of the year for walking and bicycling in New Orleans! New Orleans' network of automated, continuous counters helps us track how things change over time, and how Mardi Gras compares to "typical" activity levels throughout the year.

Everywhere else, it's just Tuesday...


- In 2023, residents and visitors took over 41,576 trips on foot or by bike past our network of 5 permanent count locations during the 12-day carnival season.
- On average across 5 sites, walk/bike activity is **38% higher** during carnival season than on a typical day. On peak days, its an average of **277% higher**




MARDI GRAS ON THE GREENWAY

Over 3600+ people walked or biked the Lafitte Greenway (near N. Galvez St) on Mardi Gras day in 2023: the 2nd highest day of use ever (after Mardi Gras Day, 2020).

This is nearly four times the typical volume of 937 users per day.



MID-CITY SATURDAY




On the Norman Francis Parkway Trail in MidCity, Endymion is the big day:

In 2023, **3,414** people passed the count station near Conti St on foot or by bike on Saturday, February 18th.

Survey Says: Carnival Time is for Bikes!






This year, Bike Easy polled nearly 200 respondents about their bicycling habits during carnival season, finding that 59% ride more often than usual during Mardi Gras season.

People ride bikes to participate in the festivities from a wide variety of neighborhoods, and use a mix of streets and facilities

to get to the action.


 25% bring their bike via car, bus, or ferry to get close, then ride the rest of the way.

Taking it to the (complete) streets!

Meanwhile, on-street bicycle lanes see a boost in activity during carnival time, too. On **Esplanade Avenue**, **1,362 bicyclists** were counted taking it to the streets on Mardi Gras Day in 2023. On **Baronne St** downtown, Bacchus Sunday was the busiest day of the season with **576 bicyclists** observed.


